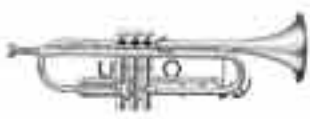

## Membership In The American Legion

In accordance with The American Legion National By-Laws:

ARTICLE IV Discipline of Post and Post Members

Section 4. A member whose dues for the current year have not been paid by January first shall be classed as delinquent. If his dues are paid on or before February first, he shall be automatically reinstated. If he is still delinquent after February first, he

shall be suspended from all privileges. If he is still under such suspension on June thirtieth of such year, his membership in The American Legion shall be forfeited. A member so suspended or whose membership has been so forfeited may be reinstated to active membership in good standing by vote of the Post and payment of current dues for the year in which the reinstatement occurs. Provided, however, that the Posts, Departments and the National Organization may waive the provisions hereof, upon payment of dues for the year in which reinstatement occurs, with reference to former members who have been prevented from the payment of dues by reason of active military service.

\*Any reference above of the term "he" or "his" is intended to include all members, male or female, of The American Legion.

## Legionnaire

### Brandt Erickson

Brandt Erickson was born in Red Wing, Minnesota, and his family moved to Minneapolis in 1954. He joined the Navy a month after graduating from high school, as a Kitty Cruiser, which is an enlistment in the United States Navy starting before your 18th birthday and ending before your 21st birthday. His sister, who was eight at the time of his enlistment, said she was happy he was going in to the Navy; she knew he could swim but didn't think he could fly.

He went to California for boot camp and his first assignment was aboard the USS Norton Sound, a guided missile ship. Brandt was then sent to school for Interior Communications Electrician. Brandt then was assigned to the USS Bennington, and the ship's home port was Long Beach, CA. Brandt's tour of duty took him to Japan, Hong Kong, the Philippines, and Vietnam. The USS Bennington also docked in Bremerton, Wash., and ports in Alaska. He remembers the residents of Alaska being so friendly to the sailors during their stay in port.

Upon returning to Minneapolis, after his honorable discharge, Brandt attended Control Data Institute (CDC) during the genesis of the computer world. Training through this large corporation gave him the opportunity to move to St Louis, Los Alamos, Kwajalein Marshall Islands, and then Aurora. These sites were and are still part of the overall defense systems of our country.

Brandt joined The American Legion the first time he was asked. While on Kwajalein, which is in the South Pacific and the largest island in the Marshall Islands, he was asked to join the American Legion and during those five years he held most of the offices within the American Legion Post 44. His highest office was as Commander of Post 44 Kwajalein, Department of Alaska, which was the State that had responsibility for the Marshall Islands.
