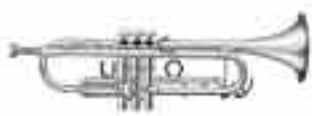

The Liberty Road Marker: Restored!

The movement to restore the Liberty Road Marker at Veterans Park in Denver is now complete. Denver was the first city to receive a marker, which marked the route from Utah Beach to Bastogne for Patton's troops during the liberation of France during WWII. Veterans Park is at the northwest corner of I-25 and University, behind the police station.

The marker is a French road pillar, also known as a Bourn or Borne. During debate about the custody of the marker, an extensive historical review reaffirmed the monument belongs to the City of Denver with a minor custodial/overseer role by LCW Post 1.

The restoration process had a number of facets, which greatly improved Veterans Park. The grounds surrounding the flagpole and sidewalk were completely re-landscaped. A large concrete marker pedestal was created, with the front being marked by a historical bronze plaque noting the origin and history of the marker. The marker itself was restored with structural concrete, and then painstakingly re-painted to original specifications with highly weather resistant paint. It was then attached to the pedestal assuring that weather or water could not leak into or around the monument to cause any future damage.

Just in time for Veterans Day, the monument was replaced. A short ceremony on November 11 marked the restoration with Commander Yagley, Past Commander Stenson, and the LCW Post 1 Color Guard.



Thank you to Dave Powers, Glen Stenson, Ken Dorman, Anthony Jones, Al and Karen Taylor, Jennifer Olson of DPR and all the others for making this project a reality and helping to re-connect important history for our WWII veterans, the surrounding region and LCW Post 1. A potential French-American celebration is being explored for D-Day, 2018 to further honor those who served in WWII.



Placement Of Flags At Crown Hill Cemetery — On Friday, November 10, 2017, approximately 10 members of the American Legion Post 1 gathered at Crown Hill Cemetery to place flags on the graves of veterans interred at the veterans' site of the cemetery. Carl Mayer, Post 1 Commander 1978-1979

It is with sadness that we received word of Carl Mayer's death. Carl died in an automobile accident, in Montana, a few months ago.

Carl Mayer was the Post 1 Commander from June 1978 to May 1979, plus he held many other positions at Post 1. During his years of service to Post 1, he was on the Executive Board, House Committee, and served as Americanism Committee Chairman for many years. He was also very active in organizing events such as the Fishing Derby, The American Legion sponsored Eagle Scouts program, and social events at the Post. Carl was very supportive of the Starlight Century Club, which was responsible for renovation of the 3rd floor Starlight Lounge at the old Post building at 4500 E. Alameda.

Commander Mayer was dedicated to ensuring that Post 1 continued to grow in membership and that members could feel a sense of belonging and pride in the Post. His years of service and dedication to the Post are still acknowledged by those who knew him and how hard he worked to make the Post better.
