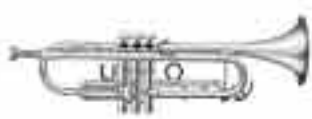

James Atkins

James (Jimmy) Atkins, was born in 1952, Balboa, Panama. Jimmy's father was stationed in Panama during the time and Jimmy was born at the U.S. Army Hospital at Balboa. His father was a veteran of World War II, Korea, and served as a civilian during the Viet Nam war, as a top-secret communications specialist.

Jimmy's mother was born in France. During World War II she was a member of the French underground or Resistance Army, and performed dangerous tasks and took many risks during the Nazi occupation of France.

Jimmy entered the U.S. Navy in May 1973 and served until May 1979, with an honorable discharge and the rank of E-4. After boot camp training at San Diego, he was sent to many navy bases, including, but not limited to Florida, Tennessee, the Philippines, Okinawa, and discharged in San Diego.

While in service to his country, Jimmy was a crew member of the USS Kitty Hawk and spent his duty time repairing and maintaining all

types of escapement and ejection equipment on aircraft. This included Martin Baker ejection seats, safety and survival equipment, hatches, latches, and locking mechanisms associated with fighter aircraft. Jimmy is a Vietnam era Veteran and is proud of his service and that he was able to serve in the U.S. Navy, the same as his father.

Jimmy has been a member of the Leyden-Chiles-Wickersham (LCW) Post for over 25 years. During his

service to America, through the American Legion, he has been a member of the LCW Post Number 1 Color Guard. Jimmy was also Junior Vice Commander in 1993. He has been willing to help out with many of the projects that required help at the Post and is almost always available to serve with his friends and fellow veterans when the call goes out for services of our LCW Post Color Guard.

It is with honor and pride that he serves our Post and as a Legionnaire, we are all grateful for his service.

Veterans Helping Veterans For Nearly 100 Years

In 2017, The American Legion Temporary Financial Assistance (TFA) awarded \$574,538 in cash grants, benefiting 906 children of 421 Veterans.

The grants help eligible veterans with minor children, meet the cost of shelter, utilities, food, clothing and medical expenses. Of the TFA grants awarded last year, \$15,500 aided 68 children of 31 veterans who were affected by hurricanes Irma, Harvey, and Maria.

TFA grants are made possible by the support and generosity of the Legion family and The American Legion Endowment Fund Corporation; 100 percent of the money donated goes to funding these Veterans in need.

In the past the TFA was available to any Veterans with children that needed assistance. Today the TFA is available to only active duty troops or Veterans who are members of The American Legion.

Department of Colorado has two funds: one to help Veterans with children, the other to help Veterans without children, and the Veteran does not have to be a member of the Legion. Both funds are nearly depleted. I encourage all Posts in Colorado to please donate what you can so that we can continue to help our Veterans here in Colorado. Anyone at Department Headquarters can assist with information on how you can donate. Thank you in advance, Colorado, for your help.
